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Research statement

My research follows **two main directions in English Linguistics: the language of fake news and spoken language**. On the one hand, I investigate a variety of linguistic features as candidates for the identification of fake news by means of natural language processing and machine learning techniques. On the other hand, I am interested in spoken language and the combination of social motivations and cognitive mechanisms of speech production, comprehension and change. I use advanced statistical methods such as linear mixed models, and a combination of qualitative and quantitative corpus and experimental techniques.

Linguistic features of fake news

[metaphor, evaluation, grammar, discourse]

PROJECT OVERVIEW: This project is grounded within [Fakespeak – the language of fake news](#), an interdisciplinary project funded by The Research Council of Norway between linguists from the Universities of Oslo and Birmingham and computer scientists from SINTEF Digital. The main objectives of the Fakespeak project are (i) to investigate the language and style of fake news in English, Russian and Norwegian, and (ii) to find out whether the addition of any defining linguistic features to existing fake news detection tools can improve such tools.

MY ROLE: I am a Postdoctoral Fellow on the project, working under the Principal Investigator Silje Susanne Alvestad. During July 2021 – February 2022, I was co-PI of Fakespeak (maternity cover). I am responsible for the English part of the project with a focus on the socio-cognitive features of fake news such as metaphor and evaluation, as well as grammar and discourse-pragmatic features. Together with the computer scientists, I develop fake news datasets in English (Fakespeak-ENG) as well as tools for a semi-automatic identification of the features.

OUTPUTS: I have presented the metaphor and evaluation studies in numerous international conferences, workshops and symposia, including as an invited speaker ([34], [35], [36]). In August 2023, we organised a panel on the language of fake news at an international conference ([52]), which spurred a special collection in *Linguistics Vanguard* ([4]). Our overview of the methodological challenges of conducting fake news research across languages appeared in *The Routledge Handbook of Discourse and Disinformation* ([21]). I also run the Fakespeak [social media account on Mastodon](#).

The art of giving advice in everyday conversation

[pragmatics]

- PROJECT OVERVIEW:** This was my postdoctoral project at Lund University, funded by the Crafoord Foundation. The work was done in collaboration with Rachele De Felice from the University College London and Carita Paradis from Lund University. The project focused on how people give advice in everyday conversation compared to half a century ago, and the consequences that their choices may have in different situations and among different groups of speakers. The project made use of a unique combination of theoretical, qualitative, quantitative and statistical approaches to corpus pragmatics with a focus on speech acts.
- MY ROLE:** As a Postdoctoral Fellow, I was responsible for all aspects of the project, with support from the collaborators. I developed the research agenda, applied for and secured funding for the project, conducted the analysis, and disseminated the results through publications and talks.
- OUTPUTS:** I have presented the project at numerous international conferences ([63], [70], [72]). A key publication is the *Cambridge Element in Pragmatics* ([3]), a new concept in academic publishing and scholarly communication.

Spoken dialogue and the London–Lund Corpus 2

[constructions, corpus development]

- PROJECT OVERVIEW:** This was my PhD project, which has extended to a life-long commitment to the management of the London–Lund Corpus 2 as an Affiliated Researcher at Lund University. First, the thesis provided a novel and empirically grounded account of the dynamic negotiation of meaning in spoken dialogue, including the constructional properties and socio-cognitive processes that play a role. Second, the *London–Lund Corpus 2* is a half-a-million-word corpus of spoken British English with recordings from 2014–2019, modelled on the same principles as the world’s first spoken corpus, the London–Lund Corpus, with data from the 1950s–1980s. The compilation of the corpus was largely funded by The Swedish Research Council.
- MY ROLE:** I was solely responsible for my PhD project from conception to completion, under the supervision of Carita Paradis and Victoria Johansson. The thesis was given an award for an outstanding doctoral dissertation by the Royal Swedish Academy of Letters, History and Antiquities. As a lead developer of the London–Lund Corpus 2, I was responsible for all aspects of the project. I applied for funding, designed the corpus, recorded the conversations in the UK and Sweden, transcribed and annotated them, prepared the corpus for public release, and disseminated the project through publications and talks. I also oversaw the work of two research assistants who helped with the transcriptions.
- OUTPUTS:** I have presented the PhD project and the London–Lund Corpus 2 at numerous international conferences, workshops and symposia, including as an invited speaker ([37], [38], [39]). The thesis comprises a comprehensive summary ([1]) and four publications in peer-reviewed linguistics journals ([15], [16], [17], [33]). The key publications related to the London–Lund Corpus 2 are the reference article ([13]) and the user guide ([2]). [The official website](#) and the [Mastodon social media account](#) of the corpus are run by me.
