The introductory meeting and first class take place on September 2 at 14:15-16 in room H405, in the Humanities building.

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Few words about learning Modern Hebrew. We begin from scratch, by learning to recognize, write (cursive) and pronounce the letters in the Hebrew alphabet. You can learn the letters quickly. We will work on them the first two weeks in class as you learn to say simple words and expressions from the very beginning. It takes some effort to learn to write and to pronounce non-familiar sounds. However, with lots of practice and repetitions, your Hebrew language skills will progress throughout the semester.

You can become acquainted with the sound of the Alef-bet letters and the writing system already now if you want! In the first link, you will find the sound of the letters if you click on them:

Attendance: A good piece of advice is to partake in all classes. Attendance is not mandatory. You have 30 classes, you should try to attend as many as you can. You will have both homework and mandatory assignments as well as exams. The mandatory assignments are to be submitted on time; they will assessed by the teacher, and returned with feedback to the students. The course is

half time, twice a week, (look at the schedule), and students are expected to study about 20 hours

per week.

To learn a new language will take of your time and it will be challenging. There will always be

something new ahead of you, new vocabulary, new grammatical topics, and reading and listening

comprehension to exercise repeatedly. We encourage students to practice, be curious, and make

mistakes and not to compare themselves with other students. The learning process is individual.

One of the aims of the course for us teachers is to guide you through this Hebrew learning

experience, which is one of its kind and unique for each individual student.

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Canvas is the learning platform, but we meet in class on campus. In Canvas, you will find each

lesson's handout as well as extra material and assignments. Access is possible later in August, only

after enrolment/registration in the course in Ladok.
